# 87 Common collocations



# Verb + noun

Collocations are words that often go together. Verb + noun collocations sometimes change the meaning of the verb, e.g. run + a business.

VERB + NOUN		EXAMPLES	
take	a photo an exam turns action a chance	When do you take your final medical exams? In this game, you take turns to throw the dice and answer questions. The police need to take action against these thieves.	
miss	the bus a penalty the point a person	I was late for work because I <b>missed the bus</b> again. You've <b>missed the point</b> of my argument – you don't understand.	
run	a race a shop a business	Radcliffe ran a good race and won by over thirty seconds.  My brothers and I have been running the family business for years.	
tell	a story the truth a joke	Go to bed! Your father won't <b>tell</b> you <b>a story</b> if you misbehave. There's no point in discussing this if you don't <b>tell the truth</b> .	
start	work the car an argument	Why couldn't you start the car this morning? I knew that he wanted to start an argument, so I refused to speak.	
make	a mistake the bed a promise	I think you've made a mistake in these accounts.  Don't make promises if you can't do what you say!	

# 2 Verb + noun + preposition

VERB + NOUN + PREPOSITION		EXAMPLES	
take	part in pity on care of	Aren't you going to take part in the swimming competition? I don't take care of the children much because I work full-time.	
make	friends with the most of	I haven't made friends with many people here. The weather's awful here but we're trying to make the most of it.	
run	the risk of	You run the risk of hurting yourself if you don't rest after your injury.	
have	confidence in	The company has problems, but I have confidence in my managers.	

# 3 Adjective + noun

ADJECTIVE + NOUN		EXAMPLES	
strong	swimmer smell wind coffee	I'm not a very <b>strong swimmer</b> . Last night's <b>strong wind</b> has blown down a lot of trees.	
heavy	rain traffic smoker industry meal	There was very <b>heavy traffic</b> on the motorway last night. The <b>heavy industry</b> outside the town creates employment.	
great	difficulty time interest success	I had a <b>great time</b> at your party – thanks for inviting me. The athletics team had <b>great success</b> at the Olympics.	
good/bad	habit luck news	Biting your nails is a really <b>bad habit</b> – I wish you'd stop.	
light	meal rain coat	The weather wasn't too bad – just a little <b>light rain</b> most days.	




