PRESENT PERFECT CONTINUOUS

1. For unfinished actions which started in the past and are still true now.

Ex. He **has been waiting** for you <u>all day.</u> (= and he's still waiting now.)

I've been working on this report since eight o'clock this morning.

Remember that some verbs rarely take the continuous form.

I've always loved poetry.

2. For a continuous action in the past which has recently finished. (You can often see the results of the action when you speak)

She has been cooking since last night (= and the food on the table looks delicious)

PRESENT PERFECT SIMPLE OR CONTINUOUS?

 We use the present perfect continuous form to say <u>how long</u> something has been happening:

> Ann has been writing letters all day. Jim has been playing tennis since 2 o'clock.

 We use the present perfect simple form to say <u>how much</u> we have done, how many things we have done...

Ann has written ten letters today.

Jim has played tennis three times this week.

The **simple** form expresses a completed action.

Who has been eating my food? (there is still some food left)

Who has eaten my food? (there is nothing left)

Form:

- Affirmative: Have/ has + been + -ing
 Negative: Haven't / hasn't + been + -ing
- Questions: Have you been + -ing...? / Has he been + -ing
