## **Grammar Explanations**

1. When we use the **future perfect**, we imagine a certain point of time in the future, and we look back at events that will be completed by that time.



Use **by** + **time** expression to identify the point in time in the future.

Use *already* to emphasise that an event will have happened by a point in time.

## Examples

- By June, he will have paid his debt.
- We won't have saved enough by then.

- By June, she'll have bought a car.
- She'll have looked at a lot of cars by then.
- By May, he'll have already saved £1,000.
- **2.** When we use the **future perfect continuous**, we imagine a certain point in the future and we look back on things already in progress.



The **future perfect continuous** focuses on how long and often includes the length of time.

**REMEMBER!** Stative verbs are not usually used in the progressive.

- We moved here in 1998. By next December we will have been living here for several years.
- We're moving to Paris next year. By 2009, we will have been living there for several years and it should feel like home.
- You'll have been speaking French for ten years by then.
- By May, he'll have owned his car for a year. Not he'll have been owning his car . . .
