DISCOVERING BRUGES HISTORY

In the Middle Ages, Bruges was Europe's main port city until the 15th century. Nicknamed the Venice of the North, it has preserved its physiognomy marked by its canals and bridges. Located 100 km from Brussels, Bruges is home to the largest medieval centre in Europe, listed as a World Heritage site, with its auctions, guild houses, palaces and churches that speak of the rich past of this manufacturing and trading town that attracted the court and many artists.

Still surrounded by sections of its old city walls, Bruges has some wonderful buildings that are easy to explore on foot, by bicycle, by horse-drawn carriage or by boat along canals that offer a different perspective. The most common and complete tour follows the Central Canal from the pier at Lovers' Lake in Minnewater Park and continues on to other must-see spots in the city.

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
